
Religion and IR Section Newsletter January 2021

Call for Nominations for Best Graduate Student Paper

The Graduate Student Paper Award recognizes outstanding contributions to the broadly defined field of Religion and International Relations. It recognizes promising young scholars from a broad scope of disciplines and topics. For the best graduate student paper on Religion and IR, the recipient receives an Award Certificate at the REL section meeting during the ISA Annual Convention. Nominations are open for all graduate student members of ISA who had a paper selected for presentation on a panel sponsored or co-sponsored by Religion and IR at the 2021 Annual Conference.

Recipients must meet the Following Criteria

- 1. The Recipient must be a current student member of ISA and a graduate student on the paper presentation date. For multi-authored submissions, all contributors must be graduate students on the date the paper was to be presented.
- 2. The paper must have been selected for presentation at the 2021 ISA Annual Convention.
- 3. The subject matter of the paper must fall into the broadly defined category of Religion and IR.
- 4. Nominees must be REL section members.

Prize

- The recipient will receive a certificate at the section meeting during the 2022 ISA Annual Convention.
